President's Report

Have you made your hotel reservation for our Alford American Family Association's annual meeting in Decatur, Alabama, on October 13–15, 1995 at the Holiday Inn? You should have received information about registering at the hotel and registering for the AAFA functions by a flyer in *AAFA ACTION*. Register as soon as possible so you will get one of the rooms reserved for our group. We had over 120 people at our last meeting in Richmond, VA, and we expect more this year, so don't put off your hotel reservation to the last minute.

You can register for additional days at the Holidy Inn at the same AAFA special rates while you visit in the area, so in addition to attendance at the AAFA functions on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday morning, you may want to tour the main attractions of the Decatur-Huntsville area.

Decatur, Alabama, with a population of over 48,000 people, has two Victorian neighborhoods that are best explored on walking tours:

- Old Decatur District, one of the most intact Victorian-era neighborhoods in Alabama, occupies the original 1820 townsite and contains late 19th-century homes and shops.
- The Albany Heritage District north of Delano Park, was once known at the "Chicago of the South" because of its development by Northern industrialists.

Jump ahead a century to Huntsville, Alabama, about 25 miles northeast of Decatur, the home of the U.S. Space and Rocket Center. Here you can see:

- One Tranquility Base, with one of the world's largest collections of space and rocket hardware, as well as a simulation of travel aboard the space shuttle
- The Spacedome Theater, a 67-foot screen that surrounds the viewers with space and science films
- NASA Space Station Development Center, astronaut training facilities and Spacelab stations

We think you'll agree that the selection of Decatur for our 1995 AAFA Annual Meeting by vote of the AAFA members was a wise choice. In addition to seeing and talking with your Alford cousins about Alford genealogy and family history, you can visit with them while touring the local attractions. Hope to see "you-all" in October!



The full name of the spouse in data submitted was JULIA ANN AVERY PARHAM suggesting that this was her second marriage. It is not clear if AVERY or PARHAM was her maiden name.

BEN818NC

Another record says born 23rd.

EBE767CT

When Ebenezer's father married his second wife, she stipulated in the marriage contract that she should not be burdened with his children. This

stipulation was not only strictly regarded by said children, but when she became a helpless widow, Ebenezer Alvord took her home, and with some pecuniary aid from his brothers, supported and cared for her as tenderly as though she had been his own mother. Thus those she feared might be a burden to her, became the cheerful support of her declining year.—from A Genealogy of the Descendants of Alexander Alvord, by Samuel M. Alvord, 1908

ELB897MS

He was born in Rounsaville, Greene County, Mississippi. This was a small town on the Mississippi-Alabama state line. It was on the Mississippi & Alabama Railroad, about half way between Leaksville, Mississippi and Vinegar Bend, Alabama. From an obituary we know his mother was named Frances, he had two brothers Everett and Rufus and a sister who married Robert Churchwell. Although most records point towards a Mississippi birth, the 1910 census shows Frances and two sons, including Elbert, as born in Alabama. Newspaper accounts of his death report that he was a veteran of World War I and served as chauffeur to General John J. "Blackjack" Pershing. Before retiring because of poor health, he was the city engineer for the town of Shaw, Mississippi. He died in the Veteran's Hospital in Oteen, North Carolina.

HAR868MS

The birth date in the listing is from his death record. The grave stone says November 25 1865.

ISA848LA01

Sophia was the mother of his children and listed in the censuses of 1880 and 1900. In 1910 and 1920 Abie was shown as the wife. There is some question if there was a second wife, but two names do appear on various records—none of which would be considered primary records.

JAC781NC

Was it this Jacob who married Betsey PURVIS Dec 2, 1813 in Franklin NC and if so, is this she?

JAM741NC

There is some controversy as to his exact birth date. A 12 November 1812 newspaper article written about his death said James had "a few months previous to his death entered the 72nd year of his age." The source of the month and day of birth is apparently a DAR record. If anyone has a more reliable source please report it to AAFA.

JAM811SC01

Was he born SC DILL or NC ROBE? What date?

JOB762NC

It is thought that the Job (Jobel) Alford who was listed in GA census was this person. (8/92)

JOH815GA

Over four different censuses he showed birth place twice in NC and twice in GA. Did spouse die 1872 09 or 1892 07?

JOS871FL

Enumerated with James and Nancy in 1880 Walton County FL, and then with wife/family in 1900 and 1910 Walton County.

JUL803NC

Julius was killed by a falling tree. Shortly after their marriage they moved to Greene County, AL where they lived for about ten years before moving to Lauderdale County, MS. He and his family were enumerated in Rankin County, MS in 1860. (8/92)

KIS814NC

Kisar has also been spelled Kesar and Keasar. A grandson remembered that it was pronounced with a long E sound: Keezer. He died of a heart attack. Kisar owned most of the land from Pilot to Murraytown (?). Eventually it was passed down and most of it fell into the families of the daughters' husbands. A family cemetery is on the left just out of Pilot off the highway by Social Plain Church going toward Pilot from Rocky Mount. After passing the church there are some new brick houses. There were two frame houses. One was the home of son John, and the other that of Calvin. John built the cemetery between the two houses close to the road. Today (1990) it is behind a fairly new house. One of the old houses is beside it but is just a boarded up shack today. John's house went to

the Jones family and Jones descendants live all around the cemetery in 1990. It is said that all the sons of Kesar were big tall me-six feet or more and heavily built. There was supposed to be a grandson named Malley who had 14 children. He had a farm a couple miles from Zebulon going toward Social Plain on a country road. Most of Malley's children died in their early 40's or late 30's of some kind of inherited disorder. No others of the family were known to have the disease. There were sons—Raymond and Raeford and eight girls. (The known descendants of Kisar and Alfords found in the censuses of North Carolina don't fit this family.)

In the 1900 census of Franklin County, Martha, age 80, was living with son Sidney A. and his wife Mary F.

LOC790NC

Mary Intellini thinks his father was either Lemuel or Warren.

LOD710VA01

See also the many articles that have been written about Lodwick in AAFA ACTION. Use an index as they are too many to mention here. Also watch this section as there will likely be frequent updates to these notes. There is little by which to determine the date of his birth. The St. Peter's Parish Register proves he had a brother born in 1717 and he and supposed first wife Elizabeth had a son, WILLIAM ALFORD, born 1734. The church record also records her death in 1735. There is nothing to prove that she was his first wife or that William was his first child. Most researchers take that for granted and many think that Elizabeth was CADE. Lodwick apparently needed some one to help care for young WILLIAM and he married Susanna CADE, sister of Elizabeth, soon enough that they had daughter ELIZA-BETH ALFORD in December 1736. Two years later, in December 1738, they had JACOB ALFORD, and that

was the last heard of Susanna. Sometime in the next few years most of these Alford families left New Kent County and were next found in North Carolina. There is a strong, but completely unproven, legend that Lodwick married a REBECCA FERRELL. Until there is some evidence to support this marriage, AAFA is not listing it as probable. Court records in North Carolina prove that a LODWICK ALFORD there had a wife named Sarah. Lodwick's brother GOODRICH ALFORD, who died in 1753 in North Carolina, had a wife named Sarah. Lodwick was the administrator of Goodrich's estate. Some folks think Lodwick probably married his sister-in-law. Some interpret Lodwick's will to include the three children of Goodrich. He left property to three females, not identified as daughters, who had the same given names as Goodrich's daughters. (2/94)

PAS879LA

It is not certain we have the right fellow here. How many Paschal E. Alfords could have been born in that area at that time? In the 1910 census of Amite County, MS, there was a Paschal E., age 34 born in MS with the family listed here and in the next generation. Included in the family was a brother-in-law, J.N. McDaniel age 20 considered to be Fannie's brother.

THO742CT

By tradition he was raised by his uncle, Elijah Cowles, whom he accompanied to Farmington, Hartford County, Connecticut, where he was brought up, and learned the trade of shoemaker. It is said that the first death in the town of Homer, Cortland County, New York was that of his first wife, Keziah. The 1908 Alvord book: Rev. War Service:

"Alvord, Thomas Gould. Sargent, Enlisted Mar. 1, 1777, Capt. Judd's Co. for the war. Exchanged for Gabriel Leverich Apr. 23, 1781, 3rd Reg. Conn. Line, Col. Samuel Wylies." quoting from "Conn. Men in the Rev."

In November, 1853, Thomas, his brother Henry, Alonzo Lewis, and J.B. Crooer left New York state for California. They put in a garden on the Calaveras River in 1854. In July it was destroyed by grasshoppers. He then went to the mines and remained there until June, 1958, with the exception of one summer when he engaged in logging.—from *A Genealogy of the Descendants of Alexander Alvord*, by Samuel M. Alvord, 1908

THO860OK

WIL734VA0A

This is the WILLIAM ALFORD whose will dated July 31, 1822 was probated in Hancock, Co. GA May 2, 1825. The will names sons: JACOB, JOHN, WILLIAM, (OWEN?); daughters MILLY REED, JANE ELLIS, MARTHA NEWSOM and ELIZABETH DRISKELL; and grandchildren CANNON GRACE and ANN VINSON. Executors were Joel D. Newsom and Hardy Jernigan. Witnesses were Henry Dortch, Levi Cobb and James Marchman, A newspaper article identified him as WILLIAM ALFORD, a Revolutionary Soldier, who died April 21, 1825 at age 84. This age would have to be off by seven years for this person to match chronologically with WILLIAM ALFORD, son of LODWICK ALFORD, whose birth was registered in the St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co. VA Register as July 31, 1734. He was baptized August 2, 1734. At least two persons, after extensive research, believe WILLIAM ALFORD who died 1825 was the son of LODWICK ALFORD, though they admit they lack proof. At least two different WILL-IAM ALFORDS are claimed as the son of the William. See also references WIL775?? and WIL788 [not in all publications].

WIL775??

He is one of two or more Williams who are claimed to be the son of the William Alford who died in Hancock Co. GA in 1825. See also references WIL740 and WIL788 [not in all publications]. ❖

Hansford, his wife and family were some of the early pioneers of Florida.

At the age of twelve Sam and his mother joined the Jacksonville First Seventh-day Adventist Church. His interest in the church continued during his lifetime where he taught a Bible class and sang bass in the choir. He and his father used to go hunting and fishing frequently and it was a pastime he continued to indulge as an adult.

He had his sights on some life's goals at a young age. While attending Jacksonville Junior Academy he responded to a teacher, when asked what he was going to be: "I'm going to be a doctor and a pilot." He never lost sight of that dream. He also attended Forest Lake Academy in Orlando, and Andrew Jackson High School where he graduated in 1941. He studied at Southern Missionary College near Chattanooga, Tennessee and Washington Missionary College in Washington, D.C.

During World War II, since he was a student making a B average, he was given a Presidential deferment.

Considering that he was working his way through school, that in itself was an accomplishment. Fortunately he had received some previous training in working on boilers at Forest Lake Academy, so he approached his college president to ask if he could be the college boiler man. The president did not want to consider it but Sam insisted indicating that it was necessary for him to stay in school. He was given a six week trial provided he continued to maintain the B average. He worked boilers at night and went to class during the day.

Sam graduated from medical school, The College of Medical Evangelists [known today as Loma Linda University] in 1948, interned at St. Luke's hospital in Jacksonville, Florida and then did an ob/gyn residency there as well. He continued his practice at St. Luke's for most of the remainder of his life. He was an Aviation Medical Examiner and President of the Attending Staff Association.

His love for flying never dampened. He even built a plane with one of his friends. In addition to flying he gave flight physicals to those who were seeking their license. He started an air ambulance service that could transport patients to other hospitals to receive critical care. He was a member of the Shriners Flying Fezzes. He established a foundation to offer financial assistance to medical graduates coming to Jacksonville in the beginning of their residency. It was also he who began

the local practice of training fire fighters as emergency medical technicians—a common practice today.

After his residency in the hospital in Jacksonville he served two years with the Air Force as a physician in Enid, Oklahoma. Thus he served with many of us during the Korean conflict in the U.S. Air Force. When he returned to Jacksonville, he entered a joint practice with Dr. Elmer Leitner that continued until Dr. Leitner retired 32 years later.

Other memberships included the American Medical Association, Duval (County) Medical Society, Wm. B. Barnett Lodge 187, Morocco Temple, and the Scottish Rite Bodies.

When his secretary, Diane Kirkman, learned that AAFA was writing a memorial biography about Dr. Alford, she offered the following:

I have had the privilege to be able to receive the many telephone calls that have come in this week from patients and friends of Dr. Alford. All are saddened by our loss, but many have taken this opportunity to share with me a special memory of Dr. Alford and to tell me how important he was in their lives.

Many people talked about how Dr. Alford would visit their homes when they or their children were too sick to come to the office. One long time patient remembered that she lived near downtown when her children were small, and Dr. Alford would stop by their house very early in the morning on his way to the office to check on her children when they had measles.

Another mother told me that when she went into the hospital to give birth to her son, Dr. Alford came by to check on her progress and told her he thought she would give birth to a girl. The mother told Dr. Alford that Dr. Leitner had already told her that he

thought it would be a boy and since that was what they were counting on, she'd just wait for Dr. Leitner.

A pilot remembered that when Dr. Alford was just learning to fly, he would come out to the airport and sit in the control tower hour after hour listening to the air traffic controllers so that he would get their 'lingo' just right.

Another patient remarked that Dr. Alford didn't just treat your physical ailments but always had time to listen to your troubles, and usually that helped as much as any medicine you could take.

The following are some excerpts from some of his communications with AAFA over the years, many coming by e-mail:

"Howdy: just a note to let you know our local family reunion will be 1st Sun day April (7th) at SWIFT CREEK CEMETERY & Church just south of Olustee, Fl. Hope 'Wick' Alford will be with us, anyhow we'll be slowly getting organized. There are several Alfords in Fl. who are members of Prodigy—are any of them also members of AAFA? I have written to some & will write more as time permits. So long for now. Sam" [Wick did attend one of their reunions.]

"There are several Alfords on Prodigy in Florida, and I have taken the liberty of giving them your name and number for more info. They are as follows [names omitted]"

"Hi: I'm sorry that I didn't get to the meeting because of a severe bout of the flu. But because of his wife's health Wick didn't get there either. My brother went but has not come back or at least checked in as yet. To answer your other? I have not resolved things as yet prob. not until July '91 (I hope), Then I'll be glad to take on some work for the Assoc." [His other problem was matrimonial. His success with wives did not follow the pattern set in medicine and aviation.]

"Gil: I have renewed my dues and from the meeting the other day I will send you by mail what we have been able to put together. It's not complete but maybe you can correlate it with yours for confirmation. I plan to do some more research and I will share the findings with you. Also wrote to Willie Alford [died February 1995] to offer any help I can give. Thanks for your help."

"Hi! Just got my knee replaced and will be back in business in a couple more weeks. Plan to see you in Destin in October. Will be in touch in a couple of weeks to offer any help I can."

"Happy Holidays and the best of the year to come. May all of the ALFORD AMERICAN FAMILY ASSOCIATION prosper and grow through this next year. With Relative Affection."

"My leg is doing well, and it is my one year anniversary of the by-pass and doing well. So long now . Sam."

"Hi—I'm planning my other knee surgery about 24th November, so I will drop Prodigy for the time being. Look forward to seeing you all at a future meeting. Thanks for all the help you have been. Sam."

That was the last we heard from him. Survivors include his sons; Michael L. Alford, Stephen D. and Jewell Alford; daughter and son-in-law, Joni A. and Ronald J. Burnes; brother Howard R. Alford, sister Margaret A. Adams, grandchildren Joshua Burn[e?]s and Michelle Alford. Entombment in Riverside Memorial Park with Masonic Rites. Active pallbearers were the members of the Morocco Temple Flying Fez Assn.

Going to the source for art in Santa Cruz

Santa Cruz is being called the new Santa Fe, or as one wit put it: "Santa Fe with trees."

There are so many artists in the county that one gallery's list of those submitting work runs to almost 2,000 names. Many are nationally prominent, sowing their work in Los Angeles, Hawaii, New York and Paris.

But surprisingly, the area has few independent galleries, so the best way to experience the art scene is to go where the studios are—combining sightseeing and Christmas shopping in one fell swoop....

But if you're willing to explore a

bit, most Santa Cruz artists welcome visitors to their studios, asking only that you call ahead to let them know you're coming. The studios may be in cabins in the mountains, in industrial warehouse spaces, in separate studios behind their homes or in workshops set in lovely gardens....

In a studio behind her home near the University of California, Santa Cruz, **Gloria Alford** soaks hemp pulp and cotton fibers in a tub, then beats the mixture, adds pigment and creates a design, laying it out on a Formica board. After vacuuming out the water with a special unit, she takes the newly made paper out in the sun to dry.

Alford also paints, sculpts and does print-making. Ask to see her "Jaded Princess," a sculpture created entirely of computer chips....

The system is currently undergoing modifications that will boost the voltage by almost 400 percent, add three new substations, and incorporate new state of the art transformers. These improvements will help to insure more consistently reliable power to members of the Cape Hatteras Electric Membership Corporation.

The person responsible for overseeing the upgrading and modifications of the power system is the new manager of the Cape Hatteras EMC, John A. Echols.

Echols, 51, an electrical engineer, was general manager for an electric cooperative in Mississippi and director of engineering and operations for another in Tarboro, N.C., before taking over the reins in Buxton.

He and his wife Dean, a cashier at Centura Bank in Buxton, have two children—Teresa and Kristie—and one grandchild

To get started in his new job, Echols has consulted managers in similar environments in Carteret County, and also in the Florida Keys. Those power systems experience many of the same problems as are found on the Outer Banks, he explains. By learning from their progress, the modifications to the Cape Hatteras EMC power system should be significant.

Stripling, 46, emaciated, with thin gray hair and sunken cheeks, hobbled slowly into the Holmes County Courthouse courtroom with a walker for the sentencing. He shot his wife's daughter on Sept. 22, 1991, after a day of drinking.

am looking for information on the ancestors of Anna Lucy Alford, who married Will Brucher in 1891 in Missouri. My late great-aunt Lilly Brucher Gehrs left the following notes on Annie's family:

"Andrew Cracraft married Delane Lewis between 1770 and 18??. One daughter, Nancy, married Dr. A.J. Renfro from Kentucky, a pioneer of Cape County who lived in the Dutchtown and Allenville area. The other daughter. Martha Jane, married Blemus Howard Groves. Dr. A.J. Renfro and Nancy Cracraft had several children including Mary, born July 26, 1840; twins Joseph W. and Martha Jane, born Nov. 9, 1841; Louisa E., Nov. 26, 1843; and David, Feb. 15, 1846. Martha Jane Renfro married Roger W. Groves, her cousin; their children included Emma O'Neal, Mattie O'Neal, Marion, Mabel Hitchcock, Walter, and Andrew.

"Louisa E. Renfro married William George Alford. She was his second wife. Mr. Alford had several children when he married Louisa Renfro: Will, Thomas, and Betty. William George Alford and Louisa Renfro Alford had three children: Annie Lucy, born Jan. 1, 1868; Jack, about two years younger; and Emma, who died at age of 9 years after her mother died.

"When Louisa Renfro Alford died she left her 3 children in charge of their half brother Will, and he made a home for them. He was a bachelor, engaged to Pauline Brune of Cape G[irardeau]. Will Alford was married to Pauline sooner than they had planned so she could help make a home for these children. The youngest girl died. Annie and Jack lived in Will Alford's home and went to Campster School until old enough to take care of themselves.

"Jack did farm work as his father and Uncle Will had. [Maybe she means his half-brother Will.] When Annie was 18 years old there was not much work for farm girls. Mrs. Louis Houck took Annie to live at Elmwood, the Houck home, and she learned homemaking, to train servants, entertain, etc. [Note: Annie and Will Brucher, Louis Houck's nephew, had been pupils together at Campster School, and they had presumably been keeping company. While Annie was at Elmwood, Will Brucher was off working on the railroads to earn enough money to marry Annie.]

"In October 1891 Will Brucher had saved enough money to return to Cape Girardeau to marry Annie Lucy Alford. They were married at Elmwood, the Houck home, October 21, 1891. Mr. and Mrs. Houck were the witnesses, Will Alford [the halfbrother, I assume] gave the bride away, and the ceremony was performed by Reverend Arthur of the Christ Episcopal Church, Cape Girardeau, in the east parlor of Elmwood."

Annie's obituary says that her father, William George Alford, was "a prominent farmer and citizen of the vicinity of Dutchtown" (near Cape Girardeau).

Annie died of tuberculosis in 1910 after years of illness. It is possible that complications from her last pregnancy contributed to her death. I don't know what the baby died of. After Annie's death, William Henry married Hattie Smith 22 April 1912.

 Lilly Edith Brucher, b. 27 July 1892, Omaha, d. 29 March 1982, Cape Girardeau. She m. John Henry Gehrs, 8 Aug 1928, Cape Girardeau. No children.

Simmonsville, MS, School in 1910

hanks to Dr. Bernell Simmons of McComb, MS, the Alford American Family Association has been able to acquire a prized photograph. As "Picture of the Past" the photograph was published by the McComb Enterprise-Journal, Sunday April 10, 1994. Julius M. "Pooley" Alford, AAFA #013 was able to obtain a copy of the photograph from Dr. Simmons for AAFA files.

The 27 persons in the photo shared a total of only 6 surnames, with more Alfords than any other surname. There were four from one family and three from another. The four in one family were second cousins of the three in the other family—all were great grand children of EDWIN BARKSDALE ALFORD, who was born 1792 in North Carolina.

The following is additional information on the Alford students and their kin. Dr. Simmons said, "I suspect every person in that group was related one way or the other to all of the rest of the group."

FRONT ROW:

• FLOY ALFORD was FLOY MAUDLINA ALFORD, the daughter of JULIUS CEASAR ALFORD and Sarah Elizabeth FORTENBERRY. She was born April 11, 1903 and died ten years after the photograph on May 24, 1919 of typhoid fever. She is buried in Silver Springs Cemetery in Pike County, MS. Julius C. and Sarah lost three daughters to typhoid fever in September 1887 and a ten month old baby died in 1900.

CENTER ROW:

• **EDWIN ALFORD** was HUGH EDWIN ALFORD, son of JULIUS

CEASAR. ALFORD and Sarah Elizabeth FORTENBERRY, and the author of "In Search of My Alford Ancestors" which was published in the association quarterly. He was born July 13, 1897 and died in Washington DC on November 6, 1974. He married Elsie BISSING [BESSIG] [from a northern family she told the compiler one time] and they had one son who died young, EARL VERNON ALFORD (June 10, 1921-October 24, 1936). We do not know where he was buried. [See AAFA ACTION September 1991, p. 73 for more about HUGH EDWIN ALFORD.]

• EFFIE ALFORD was EFFIE MODENA ALFORD, the daughter of JEPTHA JOSEPHUS "Dock" ALFORD and Olevia Luminda FORTENBERRY. She was born February 1, 1901 and married (1) Hollis Warren BALL and (2) Errol L. SMITH. Hollis Ball (March 9, 1898—March 8, 1944) was the son of Jesse and Linnie (Warren) Ball.

BACK ROW

- D.T. ALFORD or DEWITT TALMADGE ALFORD, a son of JULIUS CEASAR ALFORD and Sarah Elizabeth FORTENBERRY, was born September 18, 1893 and died May 29, 1967. He never married and is buried in Silver Springs Cemetery in Pike County, MS.
- CLAUDE A. ALFORD AAFA #017 is the oldest living member of the Alford American Family Association. He has been present at two of the recent association annual meetings and national Alford reunions. He is acquainted with many of the members and is an inspiration to all those who know him. Mr. Claude was born January 6, 1898 in Pike County, MS and he has informed us that he is going to stay around until after the turn of the

century so as to have lived in three centuries. He still lives in the house in which he was born. From his appearance at the 1993 meeting held in St. Francisville, LA it appeared that he will have no trouble making it. Mr. Claude married the late Inez ALLEN who was born November 9, 1897 and died April 18, 1983. Inez was the daughter of Henry and Cassie (Prescott) Allen. Note that Mr. Claude had a brother and a sister in the photograph.

Mr. Claude is the son of JEPTHA JOSEPHUS "Dock" ALFORD and Olevia Luminda FORTENBERRY.

Mr. Claude and Inez had four children:

FLORENCE INEZ ALFORD born June 20, 1921, married (1) Pete A. PETERSON and (2) Hall A. BRUMFIELD;

KATHLEEN MALLORY ALFORD born August 18, 1923, married John D. EASLEY;

CLAUDE ALLEN ALFORD born September 28, 1925, married Marilyn JACKSON and;

HOLLIS HOWARD ALFORD born April 3, 1928, married Katie Ruth SMITH.

To do justice to the accomplishments and success of this family would take pages, so suffice it to say here that Mr. Claude has reason to be proud of his children as they have reason to be proud of him.

Dr. Bernell Simmons on Mr. Claude: "This man and my father, who would have been 100 years old on May 6, 1993 had he lived, were very close friends. After my father's death at the age of 42 in an accident, Claude went out of his way many times to help me.

This photo, sent by Julius Alford, AAFA #13, appeared in the McComb [MS] Enterprise-Journal on 10 April 1994 under the headline "Picture of the Past" with the following caption: "Dr. Bernell Simmons of McComb submitted this photo of barefooted students taken at Simmonsville, located near Alford, Gussie Gulledge, Gladys Simmons, N. Clifton Simmons and Ora C. Alford; standing. D.T. Alford, Claude A. Alford, Y.S. Alford, Gladys Allen, Nellie Simmons, Losia Alford, Janie Statham, Sam S. Simmons and teacher Hansford L. Simmons. Claude Alford [AAFA #17, b. 1898], Progress, on March 4, 1910. On the ground from left are Wallace Gulledge, Floy Alford, E.C. McDaniel, May McDaniel, Dewitt McDaniel, Ruby McDaniel, Percy McDaniel, and Julius J. During my teens I dated his oldest daugher for a couple of years."

He married Ina Bee SIMMONS, daughter of McClung Simmons, June 17, 1916. Ina was born September 3, 1899. They had five children of which only two survived to adulthood.
- Gladys Allen married Sam S. Simmons.
- Nellie Louise Simmons (June 18 1894–Dec 31 1924) was Bernell Simmons' mother and was age 16 at the time this was taken. Bernell's father was Bernard Eustis Simmons (May 5, 1893–Oct 11, 1935). From

- LOSIA ALFORD or LOSIA IRENE ALFORD, daughter of JULIUS CAESAR ALFORD and Sarah Elizabeth FORTENBERRY, was born June 18, 1895 and she died in May 1982. She married (1) Willis Roy SIMMONS (November 6, 1888-March 21, 1935), son of Dr. Fleet Simmons [who buried Losia in W. F. Simmons Memorial Cemetery when she died]: and (2) Glenn FORTENBERRY (August 15, 1895-April 17, 1961) son of William Jackson Fortenberry and Canolia Simmons, Dr. Bernell Simmons reported that he was related to Losia and to Roy Simmons.
- Sam S. Simmons, who was large for his age, being only 18 when this photo was taken. He married Gladys Allen.

It should be noted that the four Alford children from the family of JULIUS CEASAR ALFORD and Sarah

Elizabeth FORTENBERRY were all the siblings of the father of AAFA members Dorothy Jean Alford Jones AAFA #286, and her brother, the late H. Harold Alford AAFA #226. They were great aunts or uncles of the children of Hal and Dorothy, who are also members of the association: Victor Alford #225, Jean Jones Wilson #291, Janice Gattis #339, and Jeffery C. Jones #391.

Sarah Elizabeth and Olevia Luminda were sisters, the daughters of Hollis Horton Fortenberry and Louisa Margany James. Their brother, Howell K. Fortenberry, was the grandfather of Duvoix B. Fortenberry, who married the compiler's aunt, GUSSIE ALFORD. Duvoix is buried in Silver Springs Cemetery.

According to our records at present time, Alfords have married at least one of each of the other five surnames represented in the picture, but none of the specific persons in the photograph. ❖

I have lots and lots of information, photos, etc. on the Brucher branch of the family. Since Annie died in 1910, however, there was very little known about her family, and only a few pictures have survived.

In the late 1970s, my grandmother (Emma Brucher Frye) found a box in the attic full of letters written to her father by Annie at the turn of the century. He had taken a job near Cape Girardeau. and she had stayed in Omaha to pack up and sell the house. Grandma was so delighted to find the letters-she was so young when her mother died, she had very few memories of her. The letters are mostly concerned with the business of selling the house, but between the lines you can tell that Annie loved her husband and her children very dearly and had a wonderful sense of humor. ❖

Alfords in The Washington Times

The 1994 edition of *The Washington Times Insight on the News* CD, from Wayzata Technology, Inc., contains the text of all articles appearing in the Times from January 1991 through June 1994. A search for "Alford" in the index yielded 99 containing the name. Two articles were obituaries, which will be published in *AAFA ACTION's* Obituaries column. Three articles included Alford as someone's first name. Following is a summary of the other 95 articles:

Most of the houses on Piedmont Place in Annandale bear the outward signs of the approaching Christmas holiday, but one stands out for its year-round decoration. This is the Homecoming II House, a crash pad cum Washington headquarters for its namesake organization, which hopes to see a reprise of the 1973 Operation Homecoming, when American prisoners were returned from Vietnam....

"There are plenty of things to keep people busy," Mr. Schmitt of the Annandale house says. "But if you're not working on a project, you don't get to stay."

Ben Alford, who is retired from the Army, is staying at the house while doing research in the National Archives on Vietnam-era POWs. Mr. Alford says he does not have any relatives who are MIA, but he became interested in the issue about a year and a half ago, after visiting the Vietnam memorial.

"Are there live men? I don't know," he says. "The Senate committee agreed

some were alive after the war. What happened to them? They had to be murdered. That's my opinion."

He does not say whether his research has turned up any evidence to bolster that belief; but, he adds cryptically, he is working on something important, something that may have already been leaked to the Pentagon.

Further quotes and mentions of Lt. Beverly Alford appear in 30 other articles. She also appears in a photo in a 4 January 1994 article.

In a 21 May 1991 article, she is listed as the Head of the Organization of Black Metropolitan Police Officials.

Opadaca, who was shot down in Vietnam in June 1967, was one of "many" U.S. servicemen captured by the Vietnamese who were "listed as Moscow-bound."...

James Alford was an auditor for Frost & Co., a Little Rock, AR, firm involved in the Whitewater case. In long articles about Whitewater, he is mentioned briefly.

But at least one industry critic says it's not that complicated at all: A's sell rating reports; C's don't.

"People [in the industry] wouldn't buy the report if they were giving away C's," said **Ron Alford**, author and self-proclaimed insurance watchdog in New York. "A.M. Best makes millions from the industry they rate, and the industry needs some third party to validate their claims that 'We're the best."...

Mr. Alford, a former insurance salesman and author of "Crime of the Century: Insurance," suggested

another tactic.

"The first, last and only thing" consumers should consider is whether the insurance company pays claims quickly and fairly. Troubled companies delay payments, he noted.

Consumers can check out an insurer by calling glass repairmen, carpet cleaners, carpenters, general contractors and others who clean up after floods, fires or other insurable accidents.

"[These people] can tell you which insurance companies negotiate every invoice, argue over services charges . . . and do not pay their bills for months after the work is completed," Mr. Alford said.

The former inmates are graduates of Unfoldment's substance abuse program, and stood beaming as kids attacked their plates and each other with forks.

"I just love to be here doing this for them," said **William Alford-El**, who graduated from the drug program in March 1990 after 25 years of drug abuse. "I would never have been out here doing something like this if it

wasn't for the program."

.... But for **Mr. Alford-El**, who describes the kids as "one big family," yesterday's celebration was enough to last for the year.

"It was beautiful. I enjoyed it. Putting up with these kids is like being born all over again," he said. "It's giving back."

Baseball suspends Howe following court plea bargain

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP)—New York Yankees reliever Steve Howe was suspended indefinitely by major league baseball yesterday after pleading guilty to a misdemeanor charge of attempting to buy a gram of cocaine....

Howe offered the plea under a legal mechanism called an **Alford plea**. Lawyers said that under that procedure, a defendant can plead guilty to a criminal charge without admitting the government's version of the facts.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Kris McLean said the Alford plea was nothing but a legal nicety.

"He pleaded guilty today," McLean said. "Guilty's guilty."...

A Glen Burnie man who served five years in prison for a murder he said he didn't commit has been freed by an Anne Arundel Circuit Court jury....

John Alvord, "saddler," was elected constable at Northampton, Massachusetts, in 1729, and was one of the first assessors of South Precinct, Hadley, March 12, 1733, serving with John Taylor and Samuel Smith. His name appears as head of a family at South Hadley, 1731-40.

At a meeting of the Precinct (afterwards South Hadley) 10 August 1733, voted:

"that the day for the ordination of Grindell Rawson shall be the third day of October next with the concurrence of Mr. Grindell Rawson."

"Voted that Ebenezer Moody, Nathan-II White, John Alverd, Dan-II Nash and John Smith be a comitte to send for ye assistance of such ministers and messengers of Churches as they shall think best for ye ordination." etc.

In 1741 trouble arose between Rev. Rawson and his church. John Alvord was one of a committee of fifteen appointed to force him to cease to occupy the pulpit. Rawson persisted and was dragged from the pulpit by the

committee or young men employed by them for this purpose.

In an interview with Sylvester Judd, Gardner Preston, born 1748, said that he remembered John Alvord.

"His house was west of the road, north of Brewster's—Brewester is said to have lived on the bank of the Conn. River below the ferry, some distance, a recent settler—. He did not remember his son John. Job and Gad were clever men. Gideon lived by the ferry. Elijah lived in second house north of Rod. Smith's. He was a trader, went to Greenfield, failed."

"Gideon Alvord, son of John, had the small pox in the army in 1757. He came home with his stockings not cleaned. His mother washed them and took the disease, when the small pox first appeared, many of her children and grandchildren, and others who had been exposed, were inoculated and John Alvord's house became a pest house. Drs. Crouch and Kellogg of Hadley took care of the patients from October 28 until December 28, 1757. John Alvord (prob. John Jr.,) is said to have died of this disease, and probably John Alvord himself." (Hist. of Hadley.)

His grave stone is still (1908) standing at So. Hadley.

"Preserved Bartlett's wife, sister of Benjamin Alvord, was crazy some years, was confined at times by chains, escaped from house one day and could not be found. An alarm was made, the drums beat and the bells rang. She was found dead in Mill River, down below the pasture, July 18, 1768 (?). Her husband took her with him to collect a tax of Bernard Bartlett. Bernard's wife, who was reputed to be a witch complained about the tax and told him he would be sorry for collecting it. He believed that his wife's insanity was caused by Bernard's wife's witchery and his son Benjamin believed the same." (Judd Manuscript)

Preserved Bartlett's grandfather, Robert Bartlett, was killed by the Indians at North Hampton, Mass., March 14, 1676.

Benjamin Alvord, Sr., was named in his father's estate as eldest son and was allotted a double share. He was a weaver and learned the trade at Hadley, Mass. His weaving accounts begin in 1713. He resided at Market street after 1743, His previous residence was at the end of Plain next the Connecticut River near the river bridge and tended ferry. He was chosen constable in 1743, 1744, 1747, and 1749. He was a great reader and had many books on divinity.

Benjamin Alvord served as drummer in Father Rale's Indian War, 1722-25, and was also in the "Seven Year War," 1775. He was especially famous as an "express rider" and served as such in three wars. He was very active in the Indian troubles 1722-26, riding between Albany and Northampton and Boston. Joseph Hawley speaks of his coming from Albany as a "rapid transit" post rider and being ordered on to Boston. Hawley, in June, 1724, thought it "much boldness for one to travel alone" but Alvord was not afraid. He made the trip from Albany to Northampton in one day. The pay for that trip from Connecticut River to Boston and back was 3 L 6s. His services were in great demand and he was employed as a messenger in town affairs in 1743.

"Mr. Benjamin Alvord died in his chair suddenly and alone October 22, 17 72." (Northampton Town Records)

Medad Edwards told Sylvester Judd that Nathaniel and Noah Edwards were greedy and gain and buried their father-in-law alive to get his property. Mr. Judd did not believe this to be true.

In 1770 a lot was laid out for Josiah Alvord by the town of Sunderland, Mass. In 1731 he received a grant of 35 acres of land on conditions that he remain a resident for five years. Oct. 8, 1745 Ebenezer Billings conveyed land on Harvey Hill to Josiah Alvord of Sunderland, Mass. In 1732 Joseph Alvord and Lydia his wife were fined 30s. In his will Capt. Ebr. Billings left bequest to the children of Josiah Alvord.

Isaac H. Alford

Lucille Mehrkam, AAFA Texas Genealogist, reported that the Clayton Genealogical Library has a new set of books, *INDEX CITY OF HOUSTON DEATHS 1874-1900*. She asked if AAFA has any information on ISAAC H. ALFORD, who died 27 May 1883, age 77. (Age 77 in 1883 makes him born 1806.)

A Hunting for Bears marriage list shows ISAAC ALFORD, married Matilda BAYNE 23 December 1827 in Jones Co., GA. There is middle "H" in the name, but he fits the age bracket. In 1820, Jones County was on the Indian frontier, but during the next ten years it grew to the present western boundary.

The 1830 census of Harris Co., GA, lists an ISAAC H. ALLFORD age 20–30, which makes him born 1805 plus or minus five years, and his 15–20 year old wife. Harris County is on the western boundary of Georgia.

We have found no Isaac H. Alford in 1850 or 1860 Georgia.

1850 Federal Census of Autauga Co., AL, enumerated ISAAC H. ALFORD age 40 born in NC, and his 20 year old wife, Eliza born in SC. Also in the household was Cynthia DAVENPORT age 17 born in AL. They were in the Washington Beat.

Green Co., AL, Directory of 1856 lists ISAAC H. ALFORD planter in Greensboro. We found no Isaac H. Alford in 1860 or 1870 Alabama.

What happened to the above listed Isaac H. Alfords? Where did the Isaac H. Alford who died in Texas in 1883 come from. He was not in the 1860 or 1870 censuses of Texas.

Do you have information on any of the above Isaac H. Alfords—or any other that you know? ❖

The first string of 12 numbers represents the number of white males living in that household in the following age categories: Under 5/5-10/10-15/15-20/20-30/30-40/40-50/50-60/60-70/70-80/80-90/90-100

The second string of 11 numbers represents the number of white females living in that household in the same age categories, except there were no women in the age 90–100 category among the "Alfords," so we are not including that category.

The third string of 6 numbers in groups of 2 represents the number of other household members: the first 2 numbers are the number of slaves; the second 2 numbers are the number of "free colored"; the third 2 numbers are the number of unnaturalized foreign-born people. The "Alfords" in Alabama in 1830 and 1840 had no members in the last 2 categories.

The household in the example above was made up of a man between the ages of 40 and 50, a woman between the ages of 30 and 40 (probably husband and wife); 3 boys ages 10–15; 2 boys and 1 girl ages 5-10; 1 boy under age 5; and one man age 80–90. (Because no relationships are given in censuses before 1850, we cannot be certain that all the people in this household are related.)

Warner Alford's Resignation from Ole Miss

On July 11, 1994, John Warner Alford, AAFA #241, resigned his position of Athletic Director of the University of Mississippi. The following articles relating to the resignation appeared in Mississippi and Louisiana newspapers.

Alford Steps Down

Warner Alford, his department reeling under a second NCAA inquiry in eight years, announced Monday he was stepping down as Ole Miss athletic director after 17 vears. "This is a difficult decision for me, but I believe it to be in the best interest of the university, my family, and me," Alford said in a statement released by Ole Miss Chancellor Gerald Turner. The resignation is effective Aug. 31. There have been continuing rumors that football coach Billy Brewer would depart following the release last month of an NCAA inquiry alleging 15 possible violations involving the school's football program. However, Alford's announcement came as a surprise. Brewer, contacted by The Associated Press Monday, said he had no warning of Alford's decision and "yes, I was surprised. Brewer said Alford's decision would have no bearing on his future as head football coach.

Ole Miss added 7,000 end-zone seats to Vaught-Hemingway Stadium and natural grass to replace artificial turf. The Drive for Athletics, an \$11.6 million effort, resulted in the upgrad-

ing of several facilities. Vaught-Hemingway Stadium received a new press box, 29 sky boxes and a \$500,000 lighting system. A new baseball stadium and a tennis center were built, and the school resurfaced the track facility and added stands. Currently under construction is the \$3.5 million Training Center addition to the "Doc" Knight Field House.

Alford news stuns local Rebel fans

Shock and disappointment reigned Monday as local Ole Miss fans reacted to the news of athletic director Warner Alford's sudden resignation.

Alford, a native of McComb, gave up his post after 17 years amid allegations by the NCAA of wrongdoing by the athletic department. It is the second time in an eight-year span the NCAA has investigated Ole Miss.

The resignation is effective Aug. 31. Alford was unavailable for comment Monday and today.

Local businessman Tommy Parker said he was saddened by the turn of events.

Parker said he and Alford talked as late as noon Monday. Parker said his conversation with Alford gave him a sense of peace.

"After talking to them, they mostly seemed happy and at peace with the situation, Parker said, referring to Alford and his wife, Kay.

"I was in shock about it. But, by the same token," Parker added, "as good as they felt about the situation, it made me feel good about the situation."

Parker's son, David Warner, is

named after Warner Alford. And the Parkers are the godparents of the Alfords' daughter, Phyllis.

"I would have liked to have seen him go on five or six more years," Parker said.

Parker alluded to the fact that the resignation will also cost Alford his recently acquired post as head of the NCAA's National Athletic Directors Association.

"There's not much a coach or athletic director can do about what the alumni do," Parker said. "The athletic director can't be babysitting those that work in that program. But it happened on his watch, and I really hate it."

Alford was the co-captain of the 1960 Ole Miss football team and became an assistant athletic director at Ole Miss in 1974. Three years later he was named athletic director.

The school and the NCAA are investigating some 15 allegations leveled at the school, including cash payments as alleged by current Mississippi State player Dwayne Curry, when he was being recruited by Ole Miss.

While Alford was never specifically named in the NCAA allegations, failure to maintain "institutional control" of the football program is the most serious of the allegations against Ole Miss.

McComb physician Dr. Henry Sanders said he felt Alford has served the university with dignity.

"He had been a pillar of integrity of the Ole Miss program for many years," Sanders said. "He will be missed.

Sanders said a recent conversation with Alford centered around the school's loss of revenue should the NCAA enforce sanctions and probation.

"I talked with him Saturday night at Oxford, and his concern at that time was for the university and its athletic program," Sanders recalled. "His greatest concern was the loss of funding of television rights of the SEC and the way it adversely affects the university with its athletic budget.

A figure of \$2 million is often bandied about as the possible loss in revenue should the Southeastern Conference choose not to televise Ole Miss games.

"That is a bigger percentage of our budget than what Auburn and Tennessee would receive," Sanders said.

"I think he has served the university well," Sanders said. "He is a part of the Ole Miss legend."...

Alford had choice; Brewer's situation appears different

OXFORD—First thing's first: Despite what you may hear and despite appearances, Warner Alford was not fired. He was not asked to resign. He quit on his own.

Billy Brewer might not have that option today.

Alford resigned Monday after more than 16 years as Ole Miss's athletic director, as he put it, "For the good of the university and because it is best for me."

Brewer, the football coach, will have his own hearing before university officials, including Chancellor Gerald Turner, today. That's unless something happened overnight to change things. Brewer apparently will be accompanied by his attorney, Gary L. Carnathan of Tupelo.

University officials, including Alford, would not confirm today's meeting. Also unconfirmed were reports that the school's athletic committee voted this weekend to call for Brewer's resignation. Calls to Brewer's home Monday night were unanswered.

"I plan to coach," Brewer told this column earlier Monday from his office. "I come to work every day and work toward the opening day. Until we have some dialogue (with the university), that's my position."

Do you mean you've had no dialogue until now, Brewer was asked?

"Not a bit," he answered.

The dialogue comes today. This informed guess: It won't be pleasant. Alford changed tune for a reason

Alford's decision to resign doesn't bode well for Brewer. What Alford says about the reasons for his resignation indicates the school's own investigation must have confirmed some NCAA Allegations.

Alford, 56, said he made his decision after much soul searching and many sleepless and near-sleepless nights. He said he first thought about resigning on June 17. That's the day Ole Miss held a press conference to release the NCAA's charges of illegal and unethical recruiting.

"I never thought about resigning until I was asked at the press conference if I would resign," Alford said. "I told the Chancellor later that I would resign if it was best for the school. He told me he wanted me to stay on and help the university work through this thing."

But Alford says the thought of resigning never left him.

"The responsibility part is what I kept coming back to," Alford said.
"This was the second time we've had the same problem. I kept thinking: Was there something I could have done or should have done to prevent it?

"I went to bed at night thinking about it. I stayed awake thinking about it. I woke up during the night thinking about it, and it's the first thing I thought about in the morning."

My point: Alford said June 17 he wouldn't quit. At that time, the university had just begun its investigation.

Something's happened since then to change his mind. And I don't think Alford would be worried about "the responsibility part" if the university's

investigation had not confirmed major problems, including the lack of institutional control.

University won't wait to take action

Turner's comments also strongly hint that the university has found problems.

"We are approaching being finished substantively with several of the allegations," Turner said. "When we do, we will review that and take any action that is necessary at that time. We won't be waiting on what the NCAA does. We will take any action that is needed based on what we find."

The athletic committee was briefed on what the university found over the weekend. My information is that the briefing preceded the vote to call for Brewer's resignation.

Will Brewer quit? Not unless he has no choice. Anyone who knows Brewer knows that.

Will Brewer be fired? Probably. Long and ugly law suits could follow.

The possibility of a settlement offer remains, although, the guess here is that we're past that....

Watershed event leaves losers on all sides in Mississippi

OXFORD—No matter where you looked here Tuesday, you saw no winners. You saw no smiles. The general mood was reflected by the dark clouds and intermittent showers outside.

There was 59-year-old Billy Brewer, tears welling in his pale blue eyes, his weathered face seeming more deeply furrowed than ever. "I won't get emotional," he said at a hastily put-together press conference. And then he did.

There was 56-year-old Warner Alford, his hair whiter than it had seemed even a month ago, looking as if he had just buried his mother. Alford tried to thank newsmen for what he considers fair treatment through the years. His voice cracked. He couldn't finish.

Brewer lost the only job he says he ever wanted. Alford had resigned his the day before. Brewer was the elder statesmen of Southeastern Conference football coaches, three times voted SEC coach of the year. Alford was going to be the president of the national collegiate athletic directors association. The two were teammates on some of Ole Miss' most successful football teams.

Now they've parted ways, and none too amicably, either. Brewer believes Alford turned on him. Alford believes Brewer cost him his career just at its peak

And there was Gerald Turner, the Ole Miss chancellor, left to pick up the pieces of a shattered program. Before he withdrew from consideration, Turner was a leading candidate to become executive director of the NCAA. Now he faces the embarrassment of his university being socked for the second time in eight years by that very organization.

For Turner, there are no easy solutions, long term or short term. His athletic director has resigned. He fired his football coach. The football team threatens to march on his office. Ole Miss alumni are deeply divided over whether Turner should have fired Brewer. Football practice starts in less than a month.

If the NCAA levies stiff penalties against Ole Miss—as is expected—an already struggling athletic department could lose millions of dollars of SEC bowl and TV revenue.

On top of all that Brewer plans to sue the school for hundreds of thousands of dollars for breach of contract. It's not as if Turner isn't spending enough of his time in court these days. There's this other matter that threatens the university, a little thing called Ayers.

But back to what the rank-andfile alumni really care about, which is, of course, football. Oh, what a tangled web has been woven.

Brewer feels betrayed by Turner and Alford. "Sometime, somewhere at this school, you're going to have to have a chance," Brewer said. "Somebody's going to have to stand up and have some damn backbone."

Players, as you would expect, side solidly with their coach and feel betrayed by the administration. Turner and Alford feel let down by Brewer. Not to be forgotten are people caught in the middle, people who are friends with Turner, Alford and Brewer. Again, there are no winners,

So, who's right, who's wrong, you ask? The university's own investigation should hold many of the answers. But that won't be released until its completion, scheduled for Aug. 15.

Meantime, Brewer and his attorney, Gary Carnathan of Tupelo, say he broke no rules. The school contends Brewer's neglect of duty resulted in rules violations. Indeed, if Brewer knowingly looked the other way while coaches or alumni acquaintances paid players, then Brewer deserved his fate pure and simple.

Some will argue: Well, everybody does it. Everybody cheats.

But everybody doesn't. And darned few get caught twice. Few get that opportunity.

But here in Mississippi, we seem to be in a dreadful cycle. In the last 20 years, the NCAA has whacked University of Southern Mississippi twice, Mississippi State once and Ole Miss soon to be twice for serious violation of NCAA rules. Different schools, different coaches, different players, same system. The system: If you don't win, you get fired. If you don't get the players, you don't win. Everybody's looking for an edge.

Perhaps therein lies the problem. ❖

In the name of God Amen I John Alford of Frederick County being very sick and weak of body but in perfect health of mind & Memory Do make constitute & appoint this my last will & Testament in manner & form following. First & principally I give my Soul to Almighty God, my Body I give to the Earth to be decently Buried at the Discretion of my Executrix hereafter mentioned and for what Worldly Estate it hath pleased God to bless me with my will is that it may be Disposed of in the following manner.
