# **Ancestry of Jacob Alford**

Jacob was the son of Julius and Lucy Alford, grandson of James Alford and possibly the great-grandson of John Alford. Jacob was born in what was Granville County, then Bute County in 1764 and is now Franklin County. Bute County was divided into Warren and Franklin Counties in 1779.

In his will dated July 14, 1768 and proved in Bute County Court in November 1771 session, Jacob's father, Julius Alford, wrote: "Item, I give to my well beloved son Jacob the land and plantation whereon I now live lying on both sides of the Tarr River, together with six cows and calves and piggs and one breeding mare to him and his heirs forever." Thus proving that a Jacob Alford was the son of a Julius Alford. Julius also wrote in his will: "I likewise constitute make and ordain my dear beloved brother Lodwick Alford, and his son James Alford my only & sole executors of this my last will and testament, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament." This proven connection with Lodwick along with the St. Peter's Parish (New Kent Co., VA) Register prove that Lodwick and Julius were the sons of a James Alford. The St. Peter's Parish Register lists the birth of Julius, son of James September 4, 1717. In "Historical Southern Families, Vol XII, page 58, Mrs. John Bennett Boddie lists James Alford as the son of a John Alford but that is yet to be proven. Contrary to what some have reported or written there is no known earlier connection for this branch of the Alfords.

# **Migrations of Jacob Alford**

Jacob Alford was born in what is now Franklin County, NC. At about age 25 he moved to Cumberland Co., NC. About 1792 he moved to Montgomery Co., GA and in 1806 or 1807 moved to what is now Washington Parish, LA.

Widow [Lucy] Alford was identified December 28, 1778 as having property on the Tarr River. On December 31 Lucey Alford was identified as having land on waters of Little River Dam.

"Jacob Alford, Jr., of Franklin Co., planter, to Robert Melton (Milton) of same, planter Dec. 16, 1784, for 80 pds. specie a tract of 75 acres lying on the east bank of Tar River, it being part of a tract of land that Julius Alford willed to Jacob Alford, his son. Wit: Ansil Alford, Lucy Alford..." - Deed Book 4, #665, page 130. Thus proving that Jacob was still in Franklin Co., NC in 1784.

"Jacob Alford, son of Julius Alford, deceased, late of Franklin Co., bill of sale to Simon Williams of Franklin Co., Dec. 18, 1789, for 30 pds. specie all of his right, title, and claim to his father's estate, to be received at his Mother's decease. Wit: John Norwood, John Williams." - Deed Book 7, #978. page 41. Indicates that Jacob is no longer "of Franklin Co.,"

So Jacob Alford moves from Franklin County, NC to Cumberland Co., NC some time between December 1784 and December 1789.

"Jacob Alford of Cumberland County, N.C. deed to John Alford of Franklin Co., N.C. for land left to him by his father's last will and testament. Dated: Dec. 9, 1790. Wit: Ansel Alford and John Alford." - Deed Book 3, page 119.

"Jacob Alford of Cumberland Co., N.C. to Willis Tant of Franklin Co., Dec 16, 1790, for ten pds. specie a parcel of 15 acres in Franklin Co. on Tar River and the Popular Branch adjoining Jacob Alford's line. Wit: Robert Norris, Good\_[rich]\_ Alford." - Deed Book 7, #1023. page 86

"Jacob Alford of Cumberland Co., N.C. to Jiles Driver of Franklin Co., Dec. 20, 1790, for 30 pds. specie a tract of 50 acres in Franklin Co. beginning in Tar River at the mouth of Little Beaver dam Branch and up the said Branch and on the Popular Branch adjoining Wills Tant, it being "the late plantation where Kirby Alford deceast at." Wit: John Norwood Jr., Martha Driver." - Deed Book 7, #1012, page 75.

In the 1790 census Jacob Alford was enumerated in Cumberland Co. with one male over 16, two males 16 or under and one female. We have no proof at this time but it is thought that the female was the first wife.

All of the 1800 Georgia census was lost except for Oglethorpe Co. so we cannot use the census records to account for Jacob and his family during that period. During the late 1700's and early 1800's several of Jacob's close kin moved to Georgia which at the time was a rather narrow strip between the Atlantic Ocean and Indian territory. They included his brothers Job and Goodrich Alford as well as first cousins James and Julius Alford.

Georgia tax records show that in 1798 Jacob Alford was taxed one dollar and 93 3/4 cents in Montgomery County for 143 3/4 acres of "swamp land." [Other land categories included "pine land" and "oak & hickory."] He had no slaves and 1 poll.

Jacob Alford was granted headrights for 450 acres in Montgomery Co., GA in 1802. Recorded in grant book DDDDD page 592. - "Index to The Headright and Bounty Grants of Georgia 1756-1909", (Vidalia, GA: Georgia Genealogical Reprints, 1970), 6.

Jacob Alford of Montgomery Co., GA had serial number 512 in the 1805 Georgia Land Lottery for which he drew a blank. (received no land). - Virginia & Ralph Wood, "1805 Georgia Land Lottery" (Cambridge, MA: The Greenwood Press, 1964), 3

Jacob Alford also participated in the 1807 or 2nd Land Lottery of Georgia. - "The Second or 1807 Land Lottery of Georgia" (Vidalia, GA: Georgia Genealogical Reprints, 1968)

Jacob Alford appeared on several Montgomery Co., GA jury lists: August 5, 1799, October 1805 and April 1806. James E. Dorsey & John K. Derden, "Montgomery County Georgia A Source Book of Genealogy and History" (Swainsboro, GA: Magnolia Press, 1983)

In 1812 Jacob was taxed in St. Tammany Parish for \$2.63 at which time his family included 1 man, 1 woman and 9 children. He had no Negroes and had made one improvement. He had two "using"

horses and 21 cattle.

A list: "Pre-1825 Washington Parish" compiled by Evelyn Fairley shows Jacob Alford in Section 54, Township 1 Range 10 East.

Albert E Casey & Powell A. Casey, "Amite County, Mississippi, Volume IV Environs, Land Plats, Florida Parishes of Louisiana, and Settlers, Louisiana-Mississippi-Missouri Maps" (Birmingham, AL: Amite & Knocknagree Historical Fund, 1969) which has a map with plat dimensions in section 54 with 644 acres identified to Jacob Alford and a claim date of 1813.

Plat and description of land dated January 20, 1831 signed by the principle deputy surveyor and the deputy surveyor.

Another map, source unknown, that does about the same as above but identifies the land to "Heirs of Jacob Alford" and lists 637 acres.

Pages from an unidentified publication with page headings of "Public Lands" and "Claims West of Pearl River" with sub-heading "Abstracts of Actual Settlers" which lists Jacob Alford as settler, having gotten the land by settlement as opposed to purchase December 1807.

In 1810 there was a federal census taken of the Louisiana Territory but there were no Alfords listed. Other evidence shows that Jacob and his family were there before 1810 but at that time the area east of the Mississippi River was Spanish West Florida and not yet a part of the United States or Louisiana.

Had our ancestors in Washington Parish gotten their way we would be writing about families of a prominent southern Mississippi County now rather than a Louisiana Parish. Around 1811 about 200 of the men of the area, including our Jacob Alford, his son Needham Alford and son-in-law William Maines signed a petition to congress asking that the area be made a part of Mississippi. Most of the early settlers came from Georgia and the Carolinas and were of English descent and preferred to be a part of similar Mississippi rather than a part of Louisiana which was largely French speaking. After all, just seven years prior Louisiana was part of France.

In 1820 Jacob Alford was enumerated in St. Tammany Parish. He and his wife were over 45 and there were eight others in the household - assumed to be sons and daughters: Males two age 0 - 9 and three age 10-15, Females two age 0-9 and one age 10-15.

In 1830 Franky B. Allford, Jacob's widow, was enumerated in Washington Parish. Three of the sons and one of the daughters were still with her.

In 1840 Washington Parish Joseph Alford, son of Jacob, was enumerated with a female age 60-70-his mother Franky B. Alford. In addition to Joseph who was age 20-30 there was a male under 5.

**Elizabeth**: There must have been several other children in this marriage that we do not have. At the time of the 1790 census there were two males under 16 and a female and Jacob. Depending on when Elizabeth Bryant died the female could have been a wife or a daughter.

**Frankie**: Some folks believe her name was Martha, some Frances, and some include an initial B; marriage place only probable. In 1830 she was enumerated in Washington Parish as Franky B. Allford with three sons, a daughter and one slave. 00102-00100001-01 In 1840 she was enumerated with son Joseph, household also had male under 5. She and her son Joseph were enumerated in Washington Parish in 1850.

In 1850 Sabine Parish, established 1843 from Natchitoches Parish, he was enumerated as Needham 53 NC with Martha 52 SC, William 18 LA, Jacob 15 LA, Noel 12 LA and John 43 LA. He was a farmer with \$3900 property.

Most of the data pertaining to him and his family came from a transcript of his bible.

The following was published in History of Limestone Co. TX under the Alfords, Republic of Texas, Sabine July 5, 1848.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN This is to certify that the Rev. N. J. Alford is an acceptable preacher in the M. E. Church in the State of Louisiana. As he is going to travel through the Republic of Texas he is hereby recommended to all the religious and moral men with whom his lot

may be cast. Signed: Littleton Fowler, Presiding Elder of the San Augustine District Texas Conference.

The following was published in The Fort Worth Star Telegram, February 20, 1928:

# Courage and Faith Built Up Texas Missions-- Freedom of Worship Won With Fists and Guns

#### ALFORD SPURNS THREAT

In the Spring of 1832, Needham J. Alford, a Methodist preacher and Sumner Bacon, a Cumberland Presbyterian, held a two-day meeting in Sabine County, near where the town of Milam now stands. Mexican officials had forbidden the meeting and there was other opposition. The preachers were planning to fill their appointment. Just before the hour, a person appeared on the ground declaring he would horsewhip the first preacher who entered the stand. Alford arrived and someone repeated the threat to him. "Well," said he, "I am as able to take a whipping as any man on this ground."

Alford was a muscular, strongly built man, a stranger to fear, who had gone by the name of the "Bulldog Preacher" in Louisiana. The antagonist looked for a moment at the brawny arm of the preacher stretched out at full length over the buck board, and quietly retired. - Martha Wolverton England.

Sources for this record came from bits and pieces from descendants but primarily from a family group record compiled by the late Tressie Bowman which cited the 1850 census, Conerly's History of Pike County, MS 1798-1876 and data from grandson George Watson of Hattiesburg, MS.

E. Russ Williams updated Conerly and published a revised History of Pike County, MS and this record was updated accordingly.

Edwin and his family was enumerated in Pike County, MS in 1850 and 1860. In 1850 he showed birth in Georgia but in 1860 in North Carolina. His father was enumerated in Cumberland Co., NC in 1790.

June 1, 1858 he purchased 38 acres from the federal land office in section 1, township 1S, range 8E.

He and Martha are supposed to be buried on what is, or was, the Eugene Smith farm but to the casual observer they appear to be buried on the highway right-of-way. Applicable dates taken from the gravestones. The book published on Pike Co. Cemeteries calls it the Edwin B. Alford Cemetery which is what will be used in this record.

The published cemetery record says he was born Nov 25 1792 and died May 10 1878 and Martha was born Mar 2 1802 and died Aug 8 1867. AAFA has the dates as shown in this record which are based on actual viewing of the stones by AAFA members.

#### William:

"Probably the first settler in the vicinity of Many was William Mains, who settled the plantation now owned by the heirs of Louis and Frances Buvens. Mr. Mains was born in North Carolina and in early life was left an orphan. He was kidnapped by some traders and carried to the North and

apprenticed to a carpenter and learned to be an expert woodworker. On reaching manhood he went to Pike County, Mississippi, where he was married, and, in 1830, moved with his family to Louisiana, near the present town of Many. Indians still roamed the woods, and wild animals were numerous. He was compelled to cut his way through a dense cane brake to make a clearing for the house which he constructed. Mr. Mains was the father of seven children, one of whom, Noah, is still living, a resident of Pleasant Hill. William, the oldest son, who shared with his father the trials of pioneer life, was born in 1817 in Pike County, Mississippi, and died June 26, 1904. During the Mexican war he moved army equipment from Fort Jesup to the old Block House on Sabine River. At his death he was survived by two sons W.C. and Rich Mains, and two daughters Madames W.L. Shull and Asa Vines." John G. Belisle, "History of Sabine Parish Louisiana, From the First Explorers and Settlers to the Present." (The Sabine Banner Press, 1912).

John Seaborn Alford is buried on property that was his farm. It was later known as the Iddo Alford Farm and in the 1990's was owned by Nolan David Alford- AAFA Member #0425. Some of the birth and death data was taken from their gravestones there.

He was enumerated in 1840 Washington Parish with two sons and a daughter. 200001-10001

# property.

In the 1850 agricultural census John Alford was listed with 40 acres improved land and 600 unimproved- \$300 cash value of the farm. His farming implements and machinery were worth \$100. He had 3 horses, 4 working oxen, 30 other cattle, 50 swine with total value of livestock being \$450. He had 250 bushels of Indian corn, 50 bushels of oats, 800 pounds of rice, 3 bales of ginned cotton weighing 400 pounds each, and 100 bushels of sweet potatoes.

June 1, 1858 he purchased 118 acres, section 7, township 1S, range 7E, from the federal land office in Greensburg. On June 6 of that year he purchased 57 acres section 17, township 1S, range 10E and 37 acres section 18, township 1S, range 10E. May 10 1861 he purchased 22 more acres in section 17. December 20, 1884 he purchased 81 acres, from the New Orleans land office, in sections 18 & 19, township 1S, range 10E.

#### Mrs. Ella Alford Moss

Last rites for Mrs. Ella Alford Moss, who died July 5, were conducted at 3 p.m., July 5, at Mount Carmel Baptist Church, with Rev. Monroe Roberts officiating. Interment was in the church cemetery, under the direction of Warren Funeral Home. The only survivors are some nicees and nephews.

According to Family Search (LDS records/Ancestral File), the wife of Rolly Dawson Moss (son of John Moss and Eliza Honeycutt) was Julia Ella Alford, daughter of Joseph Warren Woods Alford (where did they get those middle names?) and Catherine Euphemia "Fanny" Cook, born Jan 10, 1872, Sabine Parish and died July 5, 1960, Many, Sabine Parish. He is listed as ROLLIE R. in his funeral home record and Rollie D. in his obit. I cannot verify or document this information at this time. We have Julia Ivey as the daughter's name and Jan. 1874 as her birth date with no further info. Don't know what to suggest next. -- Lynn Shelley (email) 7/2/2004, 5:37 PM

**Rolly**: I am as stumped as you are as to the identity of Ella Alford Moss. She is clearly different from the one who died in 1945, yet is buried (at least according to cemetery record) next to Rollie Moss who had a wife named Ella Alford Moss that died in 1960. The obit of Rollie D. Moss clearly states that his widow (no children) is Ella Moss of Many. He died because he was struck by lightning while standing on his front porch. His wife was standing beside him but was only knocked from the porch and temporarily stunned.

His funeral home record lists Ella Moss as his spouse but no father or mother. His place of birth was Natchitoches, LA, in 1876. No other pertinent information is given. The funeral home record of Ella Alford Moss also does not list parents but does say her maiden name was ALFORD. Her birth date and age are also not given. Next of kin is listed as L. Alford with a question mark. She was buried at Mt. Carmel Cemetery but with no children and a deceased husband, I'll bet there is no stone. I don't know what to suggest. I haven't checked the marriage records but, like you, checked 1930 census. There was no Rollie/Rolly Moss anywhere in the US which fits. I guess I'll try 1900-1920 and see what I can find.
