Our History, Part VII By Gil Alford, AAFA #0019

In the first five parts of our history we covered a period of three months during which time we exchanged information with 28 different persons interested in Alford. Fifteen of the 28 went on to become members of AAFA in 1987 or later. Sixteen more were to be heard from before the end of the month or year, and 11 of them joined AAFA when it was formed. Six of these were covered in part vi, and three of four of them turned out to be pretty heavy hitters.

Please do not accept the genealogical data provided by these folks as correct. While some of it may be there is considerable error on much of it. Look for the official AAFA updated lineage on each person if you want better data.

The person I'm going to cover in this issue, John A. Alford Ph. D, is not a member of the association, but he was a subscriber of "About Alfords" for a short while and then dropped from the scene. He did contribute a substantial set of data to our effort and I think did an outstanding job in displaying the data which he sent to his "cousins." I think it deserves our full attention and all the space we may need to cover it.

I believe it was Julius M. "Pooley" Alford who provided me his name and address. I sent him the usual announcement about our Alford effort and received his response, dated November 12, 1982, a few days later. His response:

Dear Mary & Gil,

[I operated as "Mary & Gil" in the beginning as I thought that might enhance the response from some folks. Actually Mary was not at all interested in what I was doing.]

What a pleasant surprise to hear from you and to read about your efforts to get all the Alfords into their proper relationships. Computerizing the data is the only way to approach it, but even that sounds like an impossible task.

I am enclosing a copy of the "Ancestors and Descendants of Barnabas Seaborn Alford" as I have been able to get it all together. As you will see, I have relied heavily on Mrs Bowman's ALFORD FAMILY BULLETIN. It and the IN SEARCH OF MY ALFORD ANCESTORS by Hugh Edwin Alford, have been my major sources. The Census Records in the U.S. Department of Archives in Washington have also been helpful. [We have mentioned Mrs. Bowman and her ALFORD FAMILY BULLETIN and will be doing some reprints of at least part of it as we proceed. Hugh Edwin's IN SEARCH OF MY ALFORD ANCESTORS has been published in the quarterly and is now on the web site.]

As you read my notes, you will see we disagree about the father of "our Jacob". You say Lodowick, I say it was his brother Julius. [*He was correct*] I would appreciate your looking over my reasoning and let me know if and where I have erred.

There is little question, though, about our great grand-fathers being twin brothers. I would appreciate any anecdotal information on the twins and what happened to John Seaborn after he grew up.

I have talked with and visited Mrs. Bowman in Bethesda. She is a remarkable woman. Her files almost fill her apartment and are surely the most extensive available. She is a real genealogist in both her approach and broad interests. I, as indicated in the B.S. Alford document, make no claim to being a genealogist. You are too modest in your credentials, if you can get even some of the data you have properly catalogued you become the leadere of us all.

As I stated in my introduction, I am very restricted in what Alford genealogy interests me my direct line back to - - - well, back as far as reasonable are its limits. (My next project is to trace the Abright's back- - -my mothers' line)

You may keep the copy of my grandfathers lineage. I prepared it for my children and their peers in the Direct Line. I sent each of them (33 in all), a copy as indicated in my covering letter to them.

Best wishes for the continued success of your efforts to get us organized. I hope you will include me in any mailings of "ABOUT ALFORDS."

The following is the cover note sent out with his genealogy:

Dear Cousin,

At last I have gotten together my version of some common ancestors as they relate to <u>Barnabas Seaborn</u> <u>Alford</u>. A copy for you and your heirs is enclosed.

In spite of efforts to eliminate errors, I am sure you will find dates that are wrong either because of incorrect recording or typing ineptitude. In addition, there may be data with which you do not agree. In either case please let me know. Any anecdotes you have or subsequently find also would be appreciated.

If you have little interest in this record, may I suggest you hang onto it anyway. You may find one day, as I did, that you suddenly have an interest. It is a sure sign of approaching senility - - - but don't fight it, enjoy it.

P.S. If you are ever in the Washington area, give us a call. We are only nine miles from Mr. Reagan's new home.

I wrote him Dec. 29, 1982, in which I corrected the thing about father of Jacob Alford, again Jan. 14, 1983 and finally a note Apr. 1, 1983.

His note responding to the above was the last we heard from him:

"Enclosed is my check for \$10 for my Newsletter subscription until Feb, 84. Your yellow sheet is a good reminder. Certainly the quantity of information you have gathered (and continue to gather) makes this one of the better genealogical buys. You certainly don't need to apologize for the charge.

"I am out of the data gathering business, but will take advantage of your efforts for a while longer."

His work was 28 pages long consisted of seven major sections as indicated by his table of contents below. Our pagination will not be the same as his but I will not adjust the table of contents because I don't know what pages will apply when this is integrated into the quarterly. Much of the text was scanned and we may have missed

cleaning up some of the "trash." If so forgive us please.

INTRODUCTION

WHO BEGOT WHOM?

The late Hugh Edwin Alford, whose extensive research developed much of the early family history, stated in the introduction to his manuscript, "No genealogical history extending as far back as this record can be vouched for in its entirety, as many informational sources are obscure, doubtful or vague, leaving little but assumptions and conclusions predicated on available records". Nevertheless, his research, that of Mrs. Tressie E. (Mrs. Lewis 0.) Bowman, Mr. Stewart W. Blakely, Colonel A.E. Lessard and numerous others have developed a large volume of material that gives credence to a noble Alford heritage.

- ---without men of noble birth
- ---without emigrants on the Mayflower
- ---without signers of the Declaration of Independence.

Most of the early Alfords were farmers, journeymen of all trades, ministers and local preachers, and other occupations essential to the development of our country. There has been one common bond that still binds us together today that has provided valuable records---paying taxes! Without tax records some of our data would be missing.

Much of the information given here has been gleaned from the ALFORD FAMILY BULLETIN. This

mimeographed bulletin, edited by Mrs. Lewis 0. Bowman, was published in the 1970s and contains material collected by her and others from original sources. Fortunately for us Mrs. Bowman lives in nearby Maryland and at a spry 82 continues to ferret out new leads, and provide expert advice.

I have also consulted the Census Records in the National Archives in Washington, the large genealogical holdings of the Library of Congress, and the original family records that were available to me .

It has been my interest from the beginning to develop only the direct line of descent to BARNABAS SEABORN ALFORD, my grandfather, for the information and amusement of his great-grandchildren (and the great-great-grandchildren that are beginning to arrive). A few anecdotes have been included, to indicate that these, indeed were real people.

There are many other Alfords with varying degrees of relationship to the B;S; Alford. line. (Mrs. Bowman has a file of over 5,000 individuals with the surname "Alford"). The true genealogist is constantly on the alert to ferret out these kinships from original sources such as tax records, wills, land grants, military records, etc. If you have such an interest in this broader and fascinating approach to Alford Genealogy, there are many others who would be happy to share your interest and numerous aids to get you on your way. I have no desire to become that involved.

I hope all you "kissing cousins" find this of some interest-

NARRATIVE HISTORY

Origin of the Name ALFORD

The name ALFORD is of ancient English origin. According to English Canon J.G. Alford the name is Saxon, not Norman as some have claimed, and it came into use near Chester, England, in the Eleventh Century. Two Saxon words, "Alde" (old) and .'Ford" (way or pass), were joined together to designate the "Aldeford" across the River Dee above Chester. (There is an "Alford, England", today in Lincolnshire, about 125 miles east of Chestershire).

Early Records in England

The name "Alford" began to appear in Somerset, England, about the year 1200. Migrants moving southward from Chestershire to Somersetshire undoubtedly brought the name "Aldeford" "Alford" with them. One historian has referred to Somersetshire as the "seat of Alford family in England".

The earliest recorded name I have found was a John Alford born in 1475-85. A rather tenuous linkage can be proposed through a son, Rev. Alexander Alford (born 1500-1520, died 1576), then to four sons. (Groups of 4-5 sons are a common genealogical finding). From one of the sons the line goes to a son Thomas Alford and his wife Joan (died 1636). They had three children, Benedict, Joan and Alexander. Legend, with a little factual support, has these three leaving England in 1634 and settling in Windsor, Connecticut.,

Alfords in New England

There are at least two groups of Alfords in early colonial history that could have been the forebears of Barnabas Seaborn Alford. One group settled in New England (Connecticut. and Massachusetts) and later moved to Virginia. Another group is believed to have migrated directly to Virginia from England. Although the second group appears to be the more likely correct, a brief record of some of the New England group is included.

ALEXANDER ALFORD, born in Whitestauton, Somersetshire, appears in records in New England in 1645 when he married a Voare. He began spelling his name ALVORD upon arrival in the colonies and all the Alvords in America today are supposedly his descendents. There are also some Alfords today who trace their lineage back to him.

Two ships, the <u>William and Mary of Boston</u> and the <u>Lyon of Boston</u> came up the James River in Virginia in 1701/02. BENJAMIN ALFORD was a co-owner of these ships. Benjamin's elder son, Honorable COLONEL JOHN ALFORD, born 5 July 1685, was a man of great wealth in New England. In 1714 he was one of the King's Councillors and founded the Alford professorship of National Theology at Harvard. In his will he left a large sum for promotion of the Gospel among the Indians of America.

Records are available on other Alfords in New England: Benedict, James, William, Mary, John and Thomas to name a few. The best evidence, however, indicates that the lineage in which we are interested, did not come down to Virginia from New England.

Alfords in Virginia, particularly New Kent County

RICHARD ALFORD, born in England a bout 1598 came to Virginia with Roger Smith about 1620-21. In 1624-25 a "Muster of Inhabitants of Virginia" was taken. Listed on the plantation of Roger Smith "over ye waters from James City" was Richard Alford, age 26. On November 11, 1626, the Council of General Court, James City, Virginia, authorized Captain Smith with a crew and Captain Mathewa with a crew, including Richard

Alford, to go trading with "the Indians of the Bay of the Chesapeake". No further record of this Richard Alford has been found.

WILLIAM ALFORD in 1682 received a Land Grant of 450 acres on the south side of the York River in New Kent County, Virginia. A similar grant of 150 acres was made to JOHN ALFORD that same year. Unfortunately, no information is available as to their relationship to each other. An easy assumption would be that they were brothers who came to America together. Sufficient evidence is available, however, to be reasonably sure they were the forebears of many of the Alfords in the southern part of the United States today. It is believed they migrated directly from England, but they may have been descendants of Richard Alford who came over with the Roger Smith Expedition.

The Protestant Episcopal Church with its vestrymen was an important governing body in the Colonies. The parish was the functioning unit, and ST. PETER'S PARISH, NEW KENT, VIRGINIA, has an important place in Alford history. Among the duties of the Parish was the processing of land boundries, regulation of "tithes" (church taxes, usually 1/10th), and generally being concerned with the secular as well as the spiritual matters of the parish.

The Vestry Records (1684 -1786) and the Parish Registry (1680-1787) of St. Peter's Parish have many interesting references to Alfords during that time. Out of these records a.nd others comes the claim that JAMES ALFORD was the son of either John or William, probably William, and this provides the beginning of the lineage of Barnabas Seaborn Alford.

Development of this conclusion illustrates how a mixture of facts, logic and assumptions are used to arrive at a conclusion. It is as simple as A, B, C -D:

- (A) As indicated above, William Alford's Land Grant was along the south side of the York River. A prominent route of the time, the .'Upper Road", ran along this river.
- (B) The records show that James was the father of five sons: Lodowick, Goodrich, James, jr. , Warren and Julius.
- (C) The Vestry Book states that "brothers Lodowick, Goodrich Julius and James were required to tithe along the Upper Road in 1725".
- (D) It then is logical to assume that WILLIAM ALFORD WAS THE FATHER OF JAMES WHOSE SONS were required to tithe along the Upper Road.

[Using the same logic and historical data it seems to me that John was more likely the father. GKA]

The Move to North Carolina

Sometime around 1740-1750, the Alford brothers, Lodowick, Goodrich, William, JULIUS, and possibly James, migrated to North Carolina from New Kent County, Virginia. The last record of these Alfords in New Kent County was in 1739 and the names of the brothers appeared in North Carolina after that date.

The Butte County, North Carolina, Wills and Land Inventories. 1760-1800. Part II, gives the will of JULIUS ALFORD, filed 14 July 1766, probated Nov. 1771. Parts of this will are excerpted here. "* * I give and bequeath to my dearly beloved wife Lucy, one horse bridle and saddle, one feather bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever". It also states, "I give to my beloved son JACOB the land and plantation whereon I now live, lying on both sides of Tarr River together, with six cows and calves, six sows and pigs and one breeding mare to him and his heirs forever". Similar settlements of property were made to sons JOHN, ISAAC, and GOODRICH. Not all his sons got land. "* * * to my well beloved son JOB fifty pounds Virginia money together with six cows and calves, six sows and pigs. and one breeding mare". Daughters fared no better than wives. "* * * to my well beloved daughter Patty one feather bed and furniture and one breeding mare to her and her heirs forever". His daughter SARAH received an identical bequest. To carry out the provisions of the will "*** and I likewise constitute, make and ordain my dear beloved brother LODOWICK ALFORD and his son JAMES ALFORD my only and sole executors of this my last will and testament."

The birthplace of JACOB ALFORD is in doubt. A letter I received from Aunt Lola (Mrs. Norman Alford) in 1962 recalls having heard that Jacob was born in New Kent County, Virginia, before moving to North Carolina with his parents. In the 1880 Census Seaborn John Alford (age 73, son of Jacob) states that his father and mother were born in Virginia. Other records state that Julius, Jacob's father, was in Granville County North Carolina Militia in 1754, before the estimated birthdate of Jacob. The experts lean toward a North Carolina birthplace for Jacob.

JACOB ALFORD married FRANKIE SEABORN(E) about 1786. At the time of the first Census in 1790, they were living in Fayettville District of Cumberland County, North Carolina. They moved to Georgia about 1792. [Apparently John was not aware of the evidence that Jacob first married to an Elizabeth Bryant.]

Before continuing with the "real Jacob Alford", i.e., the direct B.S. Alford lineage, the existence of other Jacob Alfords who have confused the picture should be noted. One Jacob Alford was born in 1755 and may have been the son of James Alford, jr. oi New Kent County, Virginia. He was a Revolutionary War soldier, wounded at Brandywine. He moved to Kentucky, raised a family of nine children and died in 1803.

Another Jacob Alford was born in New Kent. Virginia, in 1738, son of Lodowick and Susana. This Lodowick was an uncle of "our" Jacob. That Jacob migrated to North Carolina and settled in what is now Roberson County where he received a Land Grant in 1764. He was a Revolutionary War soldier and a prominent citizen in that part of North Carolina. He died in 1794. Another Jacob appears in the Virginia and Maryland area during the Revolution. A fourth "one" was in Georgia in 1812.

Passing Through Georgia

Jacob Al ford's son, Edwin Barksdale Alford. states in the 1850 Census that he (Edwin) was born in Georgia. In the 1870 Census he says he was born in North Carolina. In the 1850 Census he gives his age as 58 which would make his birthdate 1792 or 1793. Since the family moved from North Carolina about that time the confusion is understandable. When Jacob and family arrived in Georgia and how long they stayed Is not known exactly, but he definitely arrived in Louisiana and/or Mississippi by 1807. birthdate of twin sons.

[We now have tax records and land lottery records that help fix the family time in Georgia.]

Settling in Louisiana and Mississippi

When Jacob and family left Georgia they moved to what was then the Mississippi Territory. At that time a pass was needed to go west from Georgia through the Indian territory (what is now Alabama). Although no record of this pass has been found, it must have been granted. (A William Alford received such a pass in 1812).

One family source says Jacob and family moved to Amite County with a Land Grant in 1812; another says he moved to St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana, in 1809. Another says he moved to Pike County, Mississippi, near Dillon's bridge about that time. Changing boundries may be part of the problem. The following table may help to clarify some of the confusion.

Since Dillon's Bridge over the Bogue Chitto River has been at one time in both Amite and Pike Counties, and maybe St. Tammany parish, it is possible that Jacob lived in all three without ever moving! Census records of that time would be helpful, but the records for 1790. 1800, and 1810 for many southern states were destroyed when the British burned the Capitol in Washington during the War of 1812.

[We now have records that show Jacob received a Spanish Land Grant in what was Spanish West Florida, thus putting him in what would eventually become Washington Parish, LA. The survey of his land is on the border between Louisiana and Mississippi or between Washington Parish and Pike County.]

It has been a long standing tale in Alford History that SEABORN JOHN ALFORD and his twin brother JOHN SEABORN ALFORD were so-named because they were born at sea as the family travelled toward Mississippi. [That is the explanation that I got from my father about 1981 when I began to ask questions. My father did not like it when I told him "Seaborn" was their mother's name.]

A letter in 1962 from Aunt Carrie (Mrs D.M. Hayes) states that "...the twins were born on the ocean; B.S. Alford told me that many times". Aunt Lola (Mrs. Norman Alford) wrote me in the same year: "twins Seaborn John and John Seaborn Alford were bom at sea off the coast of North Carolina on October 11, 1807". An intriguing story but only the date is correct. Seaborn John reported his birthplace in four successive Censuses---twice he says he was born in Mississippi and twice he says it was Louisiana! There was no established water route from interior Georgia to Louisiana.

Then where did the Seaborn come from? The source was a logical one. It came from their mother's maiden name: FRANKIE SEABORN(E). Although not yet confirmed, it is likely that Frankie's fathers name was John Seaborn.

SEABORN JOHN ALFORD was a farmer and Local Preacher in the Topisaw community, Pike County, Missis sippi. He married MARY CATHERINE FELDER, the daughter of John Felder who founded Felder's Campground on Topisaw creek. This campmeeting is one of the few that still has an active summer program. My father (Luke Edwin Alford) while he was the minister in Summit, 1940-42, collected some information about the F'elder family. Although I have it, none will be included here.

Seaborn John and Mary Catherine had six children. After the death of Mary Catherine, Seaborn John married Mary Wadsworth, a widow with one child. They had six children of their own. The last one, Mary, was born when Seaborn John was 69 years young!

Of the six children of Seaborn John and Mary Catherine Alford, five lived to maturity. The fifth one was BARNABAS SEABORN ALFORD, the focal point of this genealogical record. There is some confusion about his given name. In the 1850 Census "Simon B. Alford", 4 years old, is listed in the Seaborn John Alford household. This is the correct age for Barnabas S. It is easy to believe that an inattentive census-taker (maybe unused to a Southern drawl) could hear "Simon" for "Seaborn" and reverse the order. Throughout his life Barnabas Seaborn was most frequently referred to as B.S. Alford, occasionally as "Barney". There are enough references to Barnabas Seaborn, however, to assure us that is his correct name.

BARNABAS SEABORN ALFORD left the family farm at age 17 and joined the Confederate Army (Private in C Company, 14th Confederate Cavalry). He was in several battles, including one in which he was saved by his belt buckle. A bullet ricocheted off his belt buckle instead of wounding him. He was in the battle of Harrisburg along with his sister's husband, J.B. Williams. Williams was wounded and died five days later with Barnabas at his side. The sister, Sophia, had died three years earlier in childbirth, so their daughter, Sarah, was raised by Seaborn John Alford along with his own family.

Family data reco:rded in the 1860 and 1870 Censuses pointed out two interesting comparisons about the Civil War period. One is related to economics, the other to people. In the 1860 Census the property of Seaborn John Alford was valued as: Real Estate, \$4,000 and Personal Property, \$12,000. In the 1870 Census the values were \$300 and \$500. In the 1860 Census (at least in the South), Negroes, both free and slave, were not included except by sex and number in several age groups. In the 1870 Census several black Alfords appeared. It is likely that

following emancipation many Negroes took the surnames of previous owners.

When Barnabas Seaborn Alford returned from the Civil War to Pike County, Mississippi, he started farming again. In 1866 he married ANNA REBECCA NORMAN. I have the <u>B.S. and A.R.Alford family Bible</u> which includes a page as follows:

(JAA Note: Underlined portions are handwritten. I do not know whether this is the only marriage document)

This marriage was blessed by eight children, six of whom lived to be adults. Life on a small farm in Mississippi was something less than the plantation living of Natchez. A letter from Aunt Lola (Mrs. Norman Alford) in 1962 stated: "Your Uncle Jim Alford would turn over in his grave if he knew I told you this: All of the B.S. Alford children were born in a log house — it was later used as a barn. I saw it many times".

The five sons of B. S. Alford: JAMES BARNEY, LUCIUS (LUKE) EDWIN, LEWIS WESLEY, HOMER HUGH CHRISTIAN, AND NORMAN are shown in the photograph at the front of this manuscript. In the best male chauvinist tradition, CARRIE MABEL, the only sister is not included. The same tradition is carried into the next generation as shown in the third photograph. The nine grandsons are shown, but the five granddaughters are not!

One Final Word

No further tracing of the Barnabas Seaborn Alford family is needed beyond this point. To paraphrase Pogo: "The Ancestors Are Now Us".

To pinpoint "Us" a bit more definitely, the grandchildren and great-grandchildren of Barnabas S. Alford are included in the Directory and Biographical Sections which follow. By coincidence the total number of persons cited in the entire compilation is exactly 100 persons. In addition, the number (no names) of sons and daughters of the great-grandchildren generation is included. I apologize for the gaps and uneven coverage throughout. I have purposely omitted data on brothers and sisters of the Direct Line. Some of it I have for anyone interested.

Someone (Not Me!) Should begin collecting data on the persons that are just total numbers in the Biographical Data Section. Actually, the <u>Next</u> generation already has some members aboard!
