Alexander Axford of Colchester, in the County of
Chittenden and State of Vermont, aged about fifty
seven years, being duly sworn, deposes and says, that
in the month of January or February 1777, he enlisted into
Captain Titus Weston's Company, in Col. Henson Swift's
Regiment, in Gen. Huntington's Brigade in Gen. Put-
nams division of the Connecticut Line, ^{in the Connecticut army} — for Three years
that he served out the full period of his enlistment
and was discharged at some place in New Jersey
but on account of his discharge being lost, he is
unable to describe the place or exact date of discharge
that during the period of service above described
the Regiment was used as a privatee Morne
on the 6th day of October 1777, at the storming of
Fort Montgomery, on the North or Hudson's River — on
board the Pow Galley — called the Lady Washington, com-
manded by Capt Lewis, — and doth further depose
and say that he was in various engagements during
his said service of three years — doth further depose
and say that previous to his enlistment as above
described, he enlisted in the year 1775 in to Capt Gordon
Brownson's Company in Col. Warner's Regiment of the
Green Mountain Boys (as they were then called), and marched
to Canada where he remained until the arrival of the
Army — doth further depose and say that he is
now poor and in reduced circumstances, and in
need of support, from the Government of his country

before me this 10th day of April 1878

Revolutionary Claim, under Act of Congress, May 1, 1820.

STATE OF VERMONT, }
Shittenden County, as } ON the 28th - day of June 1820
1820 personally appeared in open Court, being the Supreme Court, for the County of
Shittenden and a Court of Record for said County, by act of the Legislature of March 2. 1797
Alexander Abbott aged 67 years, resident in W. Chester in said County, who being duly sworn,
according to law, doth on his oath, declare that he served in the revolutionary war, as follows:— Enlisted in
Capt. Watson's Company in Gen Putney's Division of the Continental troops as a
man of full age at large affirms by my original declaration made before the
Hon Truman Shittenden on the 12. day of April 1818 and on which a certificate
was issued dated and numbered

And I do solemnly swear, that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities, contracts, or debts, due to me: nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

On this eighth day of October, in the year Eighteen
hundred and thirty eight, personally appeared before
the Hon. the Probate Court for the District of Chittenden and
State of Vermont, ~~presently appears~~ Elizabeth Alford
a resident of Colchester in the County of Chittenden and
State of Vermont aged Seventy three years, who, being first
 duly sworn, according to law, doth, on her oath make
the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit
of the provision made by the act of Congress, passed July
7. 1818. entitled "An act granting half pay, and pension
to certain widows" — That she is the widow of Alexan-
der Alford late of said Colchester, who ~~is~~ was a
private as she believes in Captain Watson's company in
Genl. Putnam's division in the Continental line of Connect-
icut troops in the service of the United States during the
revolutionary war; but she cannot state how long he
was in the service; that he was a pensioner of the
United States under the act of Congress passed March
18. 1818 — and to prove his services she refers to his origi-
nal declaration — and the evidence therewith — and the
rolls of the regiment to which he belonged — supposed to
be now remaining in the pension office. His name was
inscribed upon the pension roll of the Vermont agency.

She further declares that she was married to the said
Alexander Alford, at Williamstown in the State of

Massachusetts on the twenty ninth day of August in
the year Seven hundred and eighty two; that her
maiden name was Elizabeth Leale, and that her
husband, the aforesaid Alexander Alford died on the
thirteenth day August in the year eighteen hundred
and thirty six, at Colchester aforesaid, that she was
not married to him prior to his leaving Service, but
the marriage took place previous to the first of January
Seventeen hundred and ninety four - viz: at the time
above stated.

Madam:

I have to advise you, that from the papers in the pension claim, W. 20600, it appears that Alexander Alford enlisted in 1775 and served as a private in Captain Gideon Brownson's Company, Colonel Warner's Regiment of Green Mountain Boys and was in the expedition to Quebec.

He enlisted in January or February 1777, in Captain Titus Watson's Company, Colonel Heman Swift's Connecticut Regiment, was in the storming of Fort Montgomery and other engagements, names not given, and served three years.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 10, 1818, while living at Colchester, Chittenden Co. Vermont aged 67 years. He died there August 13, 1836.

He married at Williamstown, Massachusetts, August 29, 1782, Elizabeth, or Eliza Lease. She was allowed pension on her application executed October 8, 1838, while living at Colchester, Vermont, aged 73 years.

In 1820, the following children were referred to: Jane aged 16 years, Daniel aged 13 years and Eliza aged 9 years, and a grandchild Laura Ann ——, aged 4 years.
