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In our beginning new members were provided a sheet on which they could volunteer and offer various suggestions for setting up the association. Although we have had a blank form that was used on the website for some time I have never shared the results with anyone. They are being tabulated now and I hope to have them linked from our timeline by the time you are reading this. (Probably did not make it.) Some of the new members questioned things like why "Alford American Family Association" instead of "American Alford Family Association?" I never really answered those directly thinking that the reason would soak through with use. On the website I will share these questions and give a direct answer.

We were not all that democratic in getting the association staffed with the first group of officers, and I'll explain that. Those who knew Wick and Pooley (Julius M.) may wonder why in the world they were selected be the first directors and later recognized as co-founders. There were those of you who had worked harder and done a greater service to the Alford cause, but I had three, what I thought were good, reasons for selecting them. I have never shared that before but I will in the timeline on the website.

I'll be sharing some never heard of stuff that I think will interest some of you. It won't be real history making but of some human interest. I loved our first president, Lodwick H. Alford, like a brother, and we fought like brothers at times also. I really think he was picking on me. Those of you who saw us at some of the meetings witnessed some of our exchanges—especially in meetings of the board of directors. There were some disagreements by mail though that no one ever knew about.

At the third meeting which was in Raleigh NC there was a big bru ha ha going on in the back ground, especially over the head table. I did not have anything to do with the meeting arrangements in the first two, meetings and those who did arranged for a head table. That carried over into the third meeting in which I was more involved and we had a head table. One of our members who lived in the area was helping with things and was recognized as the meeting host. I've never been a fan of head tables in the first place as I don't believe in setting folks up front for whatever reason. But for this meeting our daughter who had been in Washington, DC on business had arranged to go back to Texas via Raleigh so she could attend the meeting. She, my wife and I were seated together at one of the regular tables and Wick came over and told me I was supposed to be at the head table. I explained and he went on looking for more head table prospects. As I remember there were two or three officers there but there was space. About that time some members, strangers to the officers sitting there, began to come up and sit down and the officers present told them to move on that the table was reserved for AAFA leaders. They, who I'll mention on the website but not here, told them that they were close kin of Wick's and that he had sent them.

That was not all that bad, but after the meeting I received a copy of a letter (no email then) that Wick had sent to our host and he really read her out as only an old sea captain could do. It really ticked me off after her volunteering and how hard she had tried. I unloaded on Wick with a response, a copy of which went to the host, and then I wrote him another letter that was just between the two of us and as he described—"took him to the woodpile." I'll share copies of these letters with names and all on the website in the timeline. As best I can remember there was not another meeting after that for which we had a head table for the banquet.

A lot of things have been on the website for years that represent part of our history but have not be identified as such. They will be listed in the timeline and links provided as applicable.

One of our officers recently suggested fixing nice color pages that members might want to save or download, print and keep as souvenirs. If there are such things that you have in mind let us know and they will be prepared and notice given about how to access them.
